Jeremiah 31:31-34 // October 9, 2022 AM

I. God restores us to the knowledge of Himself by reversing our adulterous breach.

II. God restores us to the knowledge of Himself by replacing our adulterous bent.

III. God restores us to the knowledge of Himself by remitting our adulterous background.

QUESTIONS FOR FAMILY WORSHIP

1. What is the context of Jeremiah's prophecy of the new covenant? Why is that important to understand?
2. In what ways is the new covenant like the old, and in what ways is it different? What illustration did Pastor Nick use to help us grasp this?
3. How is God's covenant related to our knowledge of Him? Can we truly know Him apart from this relationship?
4. How does God ensure that His people won't break this covenant like they did under the old?
5. How might our sinful past keep us from enjoying a covenant bond with God and growing in the knowledge of Him? What solution does God provide in the new covenant?
6. Who is the Mediator of this covenant? And what does it mean for Him to mediate our broken relationship with God?
7. How does familiarity with this text and with the gospel often dull our senses to the amazingness of God's grace? What ought to be our response in light of this passage understood in its context, and how ought that to fuel our pursuit of the knowledge of God?

QUESTIONS FOR PRIVATE REFLECTION

1. Do I view my relationship with God as a covenantal marriage which requires my exclusive, whole-person devotion to God?
2. Have I lost my sense of unworthy wonder that God would set His love upon a sinner like me?
3. Why should this promise of a new covenant fuel a passion within me to know God?
